### "Lost and Found... in a world that's gone viral" by member, Daniel Schaffer



For many of us, the "added time," brought on by the coronavirus, has provided an opportunity to reach out to old friends and colleagues long separated by time and space. That's certainly been true in my case, where the pandemic's reach has spurred a continual stream of emails from people l've been in contact with only sporadically since moving back to the

states nearly a decade ago. Virtually all the messages begin with a simple salutation – "how are you doing?" Virtually all end with a simple wish – "be well, be safe."

There's Raniero and Adelaide, friends from Trieste, Italy, who were planning to marry in Portugal, in May. The arrangements were all set. And then they weren't – upended by the coronavirus. They live in a 750-square foot apartment in the center of the city. Except for long hours spent on a tiny balcony, they have left the interior of their home just once a week for groceries and other essentials. Confinement in close quarters has defined their daily lives for more than two months.

There's Gisela, a self-taught, multilingual editor, who has retired to a farm in Cividale del Friuli, in northern Italy, where she cares for chickens and goats and tends to a large vegetable patch and fruit orchard. She's managed to create a safe haven for herself. What was intended to be a lifestyle choice has become an alluring source of survival and vitality in this unusual time. Over the past two months, she's ventured beyond her property boundaries just once.

There's Moneef Z'oubi as well, with whom I've collaborated on several writing projects. He's emailed to let me know that he and his family are doing fine despite being unexpectedly separated. Since mid-March, he's been living as a single parent with his younger son in Amman, Jordan. Meanwhile, his older son and daughter, university students in England, continue to reside there, and his wife, a visiting professor in Qatar, finds herself stranded, awaiting for flights to resume.

And there's more... messages from Vickie in Germany, Mohamed in Sudan, and Concetta, Robbie, and Susan in Italy. The latter is an American expatriate who has resided in Italy for decades. She's recently purchased a second home in eastern Oregon and has emailed to ask how her "newly re-adopted" country is doing in this time of trouble.

And then there's Sandra, a graphic artist from Trieste, with whom I worked closely for many years. She sent a message with a photo attachment glimpsing at the neighborhood where I once lived. In the foreground are her husband and two daughters – all adorned with surgical masks, now required attire in Italy. The message is clear. Much has changed since I left, but the neighborhood where I once lived endures. And, yes, this too: Friendships created over a lifetime may be stretched and frayed by distance and time, but they never really disappear.

I just hope it won't take another pandemic to re-learn what I should have known all along.



with the promise (which we have kept) that at least 1 title would be available RIGHT NOW to download.

#### Brain Health Tip: Grab a Jigsaw Puzzle

Jigsaw Puzzles are resurging in popularity – especially during the shelter-in-place order. But, as we prepare to enter Phase One and leave our homes, keep the puzzles handy. A jigsaw puzzle requires your full attention and the benefits are magical.



Because puzzling exercises both the left and right sides of your brain, your problem-solving skills and attention are increased. Your short-term memory is improved because puzzling reinforces connections between brain cells. Focusing on a single image for a period of time produces a meditative-like state that helps reduce stress and relieve

anxiety. Studies show that jigsaw and crossword puzzlers tend to live longer and are less likely to develop Alzheimer's, memory loss or dementia. Neurological studies published in the JAMA of Neurology (8.18) showed that elderly people who did puzzles regularly had brain scans comparable to 25-year-olds.

Hardin King met with Deborah Dancik, the University Librarian, and also with Marlene Moore. The result was to initiate a new policy for ICL effective Fall 2013.
