Focus Gallery in the Mark and Janeth Sponeburgh Gallery

Brenda P and Prints from the Permanent Collection is a small exhibition that highlights the museum's works by prominent 20th-century Black artists in combination with a spectacular loan of Barkley Hendricks' powerful Brenda P. This loan has been made possible through the Art Bridges foundation which lends outstanding examples of American art to museums across the country.

A New Look to the Carl Hall Gallery

A reinstallation of the Carl Hall Gallery, organized by Jonathan Bucci, curator of collections and exhibitions and Elizabeth Garrison, curator of education, showcases new and never before seen works of art. This reinstallation provides the museum with an opportunity to share art that captures the rich and varied expressions that have taken place during the past century, which has been marked by rapid changes in the art world, the Northwest, and its landscape. The gallery is named for Carl Hall (1921-1996), who taught at Willamette University for nearly 40 years and painted a luminous record of his response to the region.

Tech Tip: Beware of COVID Scams

MaPS Credit Union has warned it's members about three major scams these days:

COVID phishing attacks – you get an email from a law firm claiming you are part of a class-action lawsuit and you have to open the attachment to take immediate action. Opening the attachment downloads software that allows the scammers to take over your computer.

Protect yourself and be cautious of any attachments related to COVID lawsuits or anything from someone you do not know. If you aren't sure, call the website directly rather than the email link.

Account Takeovers – many consumers are shopping remotely and this can lead to online retail scams, like account takeovers where scammers hack a company's database to break into a customer's account.

Protect yourself and outsmart the scammers by checking your current accounts for sudden orders and delete dormant accounts or accounts you rarely use.

The Contact Tracer Scam – The FTC is warning that a scammer will impersonate a contact tracer and reach out to you via a phone call or text and ask for your personal information, including your Social Security number claiming that they need it for their work. They may also ask that you click on an embedded link which will grant them access to your phone. This scam is a form of identity theft.

Protect yourself and know that real contact tracers will always identify themselves and their department. Verify their authenticity before responding and know that they will *never* ask for your Social Security number.

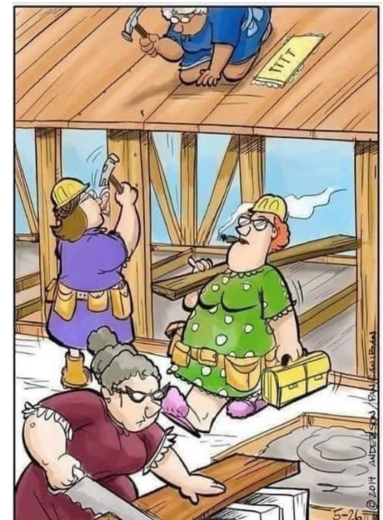

Remember that in 46 BC, there were two extra months. It was called the "year of confusion."

Shot in 1902, "[The Flying Train](#)" takes viewers on an uncommonly crisp journey aboard a suspended railcar. Throughout the two-minute video, riders see Wuppertal residents walking across pedestrian bridges and down dirt roadways more than a century ago.

The city is known still today for its schwebbahn, which is a style of hanging railway that's unique to Germany.
