Marion Co - Waste Reduction and Recycling

Thanksgiving is nigh and the tradition of food gatherings is upon us. Thus, I need you to follow me for a moment for this brief thought experiment: Just imagine a typical traditional Thanksgiving spread...piled across a large table. Now, mentally cut the table in half.

Now, take one of those halves and cut it in half again. How much is left? It should be one-quarter of what you started with, which is an important fraction in my little exercise, as it represents the amount of food that ends up in Marion County's garbage every single day. That's right...in Marion County, a little over a quarter of our garbage is food waste. And, because food waste has such a significant environmental impact, <u>Oregon's Dept. of Environmental Quality</u> has identified food waste prevention to be a top priority.

BRAIN TIP: The Holiday Brain

Did you know that this actually exists? Researchers have identified five interlinked areas of the brain that get activated when you think about or get involved in Christmas-related activities. The researchers have titled this area of the brain "the Christmas Spirit Network." The activity is associated with a sense of spirituality, the recognition of facial emotions, and the somatic senses, like touch, pressure, temperature, motion, etc. Of course, the activity was significantly higher in people who celebrate holiday traditions with positive associations than those who had no traditions.

In an effort to study why employees sometimes felt conflicted around the holiday – wondering whether to get a boss a gift or whether to openly celebrate – they found that employees were most engaged when the activities included philanthropic initiatives like food drives and Showcasing talented young photographers, gifted amateurs and established professionals, the competition showcases a diverse range of images and tells the often fascinating stories behind the creation of the works, from formal commissioned portraits to more spontaneous and intimate moments capturing friends and family. <u>Until 31 March 2021</u>

TECH TIP: Choose a Password that is Difficult to Hack

It may seem like a no-brainer, but many people use simple passwords because they are easy to remember. Of course, that can make them easy to hack, too!

Avoid using a string of numbers or letters (like 123456 and qwerty on the keyboard, or aaaa and 123abc). Under no circumstances should you use anything related to personal information, like birthdates, phone numbers or even your name or the name of someone in your family. Clearly it isn't fun to have multiple passwords and yet, it is essential. Although 8 characters is often the minimum, 12 is a good number to start with. Combine capital and small letters with symbols and numbers. NordPass and other programs will generate a password for you and store it.

This year, not only did it drop to the 31st position, but was also beaten by "aaron431" (18th place), which became the most popular name for a password.
