



Global pandemic, economic crisis, rising extremism, protest in the streets, insurrection, contested elections, racialized violence, impeachment. In my 30+ year teaching career, I've dealt with all of these topics—as history. Yet over the past several years—and particularly over the past year, I find myself teaching these histories in the classroom just as new incarnations of these events play out across the country (and, in some cases, right outside our classroom window). In this talk, I'll reflect on the ways in which the history I teach has collided with our present moment. How does the immediacy of these events impact our experience in the classroom? How do student experiences of—and concerns about—their present world affect their engagement with the past?

Ellen Eisenberg is the Dwight and Margaret Lear Professor of American History at Willamette University, where she has taught since 1990. She teaches courses on American history since Reconstruction, immigration and ethnic history, African American history, American Jewish history, and a research seminar called History in the Archives.

Recycle Right! (Department of Environmental Quality)

To protect the environment and reduce waste, it's important to learn how to recycle right. With so many items to sort, it can be confusing to know what is and isn't recyclable. If you recycle at home, check the list below to make sure you're recycling right. It won't take long, but it will make a difference for the environment!

Know before you throw. Always keep these five items *out* of your household recycling bin (more info at the link):

- 1. Plastic bags and plastic wrap
- 2. Batteries (in Salem and some surrounding towns, household batteries are accepted in the small red or blue curbside recycling basket)
- 3. Clothing, textiles and fabric
- 4. Styrofoam (TM)
- 5. Frozen and refrigerated food boxes

Brain Tip: The 'Winter Brain'

For many years, studies have shown that moods and behaviors do change with the seasons, along with brain activity. You've probably heard of SAD - Seasonal Affective Disorder - which is a type of depression triggered by the long, darker days. But in older people, our memory and concentration peak in late summer months and drop during the winter months.

It also turns out that our decision-making is affected by the colder months. The theory is that, as our bodies work to keep warm, they consume the resources that might otherwise be used for mental processing.

It helps to get more vitamin D with a walk outside - even on a gray day - and to eat vitamin D-rich foods. Keep your house and toes warm. Wear colors that make you happy and work on projects that keep your brain and body active. And as always, maintain a regular sleep cycle.
