### [Oregon Legislature and OLIS:](#)

The 81st Legislative Assembly convened for Legislative Session Friday, January 22nd, 2021 and will go until the end of June. The following is a satellite view of what's happening and how to find out more information on the sessions, the legislators, the bills, etc.

Legislative Session is the period of time in which the Legislative Assembly is convened for the purpose of lawmaking. Regular sessions convene each January and may last 160 days in odd-numbered years and 35 days in even-numbered years.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Oregon State Capitol is open to authorized personnel only, including employees, members, and

A **Bill** is proposed legislation considered by the legislature. A Bill may create a new law, or amend or repeal an existing law. Legislators vote on Bills as they move through the legislative process.

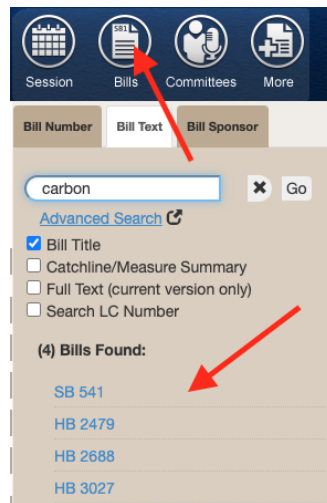
### How Do I Find a Bill?

You can look through the [current list of bills](#), but the more efficient method is to use the [Oregon Legislative Information System \(OLIS\)](#).

There are multiple ways to find a bill. Start by going to [OLIS](#) and clicking on the Bill icon (see figure, top red arrow)

A menu comes up with 3 tabs at the top for searching by Bill Number, Bill Text, and Bill Sponsor.

Each of those in turn will drop several search tools to find your bill.



- Enter as much as you know. E.g. “SB #####”, “HB #####” and/or just the number. Hit search.
- If there is only one result, it will take you to that bill. Otherwise a list will be displayed of possible bills (bottom red arrow in figure). *Note: you can hover over the bill number and the catchline of the bill will display.*
- Select the bill you are looking for and it will take you to the Bill Overview page.
- You can search by a keyword. Click on the Bill Text tab.
- You can enter part or all of a phrase you wish to search. The longer the phrase, the fewer the results. The shorter the search text, the more hits you’ll get.

*Note: this is not a full measure text search and will not search the full measure for the keywords you have entered.*

- You can search by who has sponsored a bill. Click on the Bill Sponsor tab.
- You can enter a member’s name or select from the list of members.
- From the list you can select bills based on whether they were Chief Sponsor or Sponsor.

A URL is a website address. It stands for Universal Resource Locator. Most URLs begin with the letters www (World Wide Web) and end with a dot followed by the type of website.

- .com = a business or commercial enterprise (the most common)
- .org = a non-profit organization
- .edu = an educational institution (like WillametteUniversity.edu)
- .gov = a government agency
- .mil = a military agency
- .net = another common ending for a commercial site

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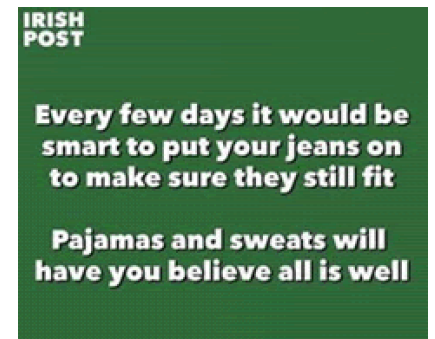
