- Willamette's ROC update: On Wednesday, March 10, Willamette's Reopening Operations Committee (ROC) shared that they continue to review their on-campus policies. The recent reduction of Marion County from 'extreme risk' to 'high risk' allowed WU to open admission tours to prospective students, broadened event guidelines to allow more than 6 people for both indoor and outdoor in-person events and to open residence hall lounge areas to 6 people.

They continue to reassess campus community priorities and, within the Oregon Health Authority guidelines, will keep us all posted about future access to the campus.

Curriculum Committee Meeting Notes:

The Curriculum Committee continues to look ahead to next Fall and Spring for a robust set of presentations. While potpourris are important and missed these days, they are more difficult to present via Zoom. There is also consideration to set aside a special Thursday morning for the book discussion. Kasia and Eric will be in touch with Willamette to get an idea of when we might be able to return to campus. In the meantime, the Committee is going forward with a schedule via Zoom in the Fall.

To ask a question, those joining on a computer or smart device have the option of typing in a question or asking the question live. Those joining by telephone can "raise hand" to ask questions live. (To raise your hand on a regular telephone, press *9)

With the online format, you are required to register for each program. After registering, you will receive an email with instructions for joining the webinar. You will also receive reminders with the same information.

Salem Public Library provides delivery services to library card holders who are unable to visit or use the library because of disability, extended illness, residence in a care facility, or advanced age.

Operation Bookshelf (OBS): Home and individual delivery; the library homebound services program for individuals. OBS users may borrow up to 20 items per month including:

- Regular or large print books
- Audiobooks
- Magazines
- Music
- DVDs

OBS is a partnership between the Salem Public Library and the Assistance League of Salem-Keizer. Salem Public Library staff collects the items you request and prepares them for delivery. Assistance League volunteers deliver items to you once a month. They allege that it is a promotion to get the word out about gift cards for this company. If you hesitate, they can sweeten the deal and offer some additional perk – like AT&T offering free movie channels. Gift cards to scammers are like cash and there is no way for you to recuperate anything after the gift card numbers and the transaction are shared. It is always a scam if someone asks you to use gift cards to pay a bill, to bail someone out of jail, or to fix any other emergency.
