Tuesday, May 25, 7:00 PM - 8:00 PM - on Zoom


ICL Member, Lois Rosen, will be one of two featured readers followed by an open mic.

stick. A photo stick looks like a thumb drive and allows you to download and protect all of these memories on the stick. Typically, you can save up to 60,000 photos and videos without individually backing up each one. It even finds the photos for you! They are available for all devices – computers, tablets, phones...and require no extra software. You simply plug the stick into a USB slot and it's ready to run. You can add more photos as you take them, too. Photos tend to take up a lot of space on your device and putting them on a photo stick frees up memory. They start around \$35 for a basic photo stick.
