OUR SALEM: View Proposed Changes to Neighborhood Hubs

We have made changes to proposed neighborhood hubs based on community input and analysis. Those changes include:

- Reducing the number of proposed neighborhood hubs by nearly two-thirds
- Adding restrictions to the types of uses allowed in proposed hubs and adding additional standards

You can see a <u>preliminary map of the proposed location changes</u> and a <u>revised overview of the proposed neighborhood hub zone</u> on the Our Salem project website.

The proposed neighborhood hub changes will be incorporated into the revisions we are making to the proposed zoning map. We expect to have a revised zoning map available by late August or early September.

After the revised map is complete, the proposed zoning changes will still not be final. Changes will not be final until they go through the formal adoption process, which is expected at the end of this year. That process will include public hearings in which you can participate.

Researchers rediscover coffee plant that could thrive in a warmer world

The species was once commonly grown in West Africa.

There are more than a hundred species of coffee plants. But nearly all the coffee we drink comes from just two: Arabica and robusta. Yet it's getting harder to grow them as the climate warms.

"The main issues are drought and increasing temperatures," says Aaron Davis, head of coffee research at the Kew Royal Botanic Gardens in the U.K.

He's been working to identify other coffee species that taste as good as Arabica but can better grow in a warmer climate.

One promising candidate is stenophylla, a species that was once widely farmed in West Africa.

"We were in contact with people that had a memory from their childhood of this coffee and said it was absolutely wonderful. But when we went out and spoke to farmers ... nobody had any knowledge of it," Davis says.

But with the help of local experts, Davis's team searched for and found stenophylla growing in a forest in Sierra Leone. They roasted a small sample.

"The aroma and the fragrance of the coffee was wonderful," he says. "It actually tasted like Arabica coffee."

But it can grow in temperatures up to 12 degrees warmer. So with cultivation and breeding, stenophylla could give coffee farmers a more climate-resilient crop.

A Word to know: Hygge

[HOO-gah] noun Origin: Danish, 1960

- A general mood of coziness
- A lifestyle culture adopted from Scandinavia, emphasizing comfort and contentment

"Winter is the perfect time to embrace hygge and fill your life with warm sweaters and candles."

About Hygge

Get comfortable with this Danish word for coziness. Elements of hygge include Here are some ideas:

- Use a mixture of upper- and lowercase because passwords are case sensitive.
- Use symbols if the system allows
- Avoid spaces because some applications will trim them away
- Use a combination of letters and numbers, or a phrase like "many colors" using only the consonants, e.g., mnYc0l0rz or a misspelled phrase, e.g., 2HotPeetzas or ItzAGurl.

For example: Pick something obscure:

- An odd character in an otherwise familiar term, such as phnybon instead of funnybone
- A combination of two unrelated words like cementhat (cement hat)
- An acronym for an easy to remember quote or phrase like YCTaODNT (You Can't Teach an Old Dog New Tricks)
- A deliberately misspelled term, e.g., Wdn-G8 (Wooden Gate) or HersL00kn@U (Here's looking at you).
- Replace a letter with another letter, symbol or combination, but don't be too obvious about it. Replacing o with 0 or a with 2 or i with 1 is something that hackers just expect. It is definitely better than nothing, but replacing 0 with () would be stronger as it makes your password longer and is not as obvious
- An easily phonetically pronounceable nonsense word, like RooB-Red or good-eits.
- Two words separated by a non-alphabetic, non-numeric, or punctuation character, like PC%Kat or dog,~1#

Do not use...

- Any form of your name or that of relatives or pets forward, backward, nickname or initials
- Any ID number or user ID or any part of them. This includes license plates and social security numbers
- Any common name
- Fewer than eight characters (The shorter the password, the easier it is to hack)
- Your phone number, address, birthday or anniversary (These are too easy to find)
- Names in popular culture like Harry_Potter or GameofThrones
- Any word that exactly matches a word in the dictionary
