#### New Netflix Series: <u>Penguin</u> <u>Town</u>

In a picturesque South African town, an eclectic group of endangered penguins flock together to find mates, raise Joan joined ICL in 2014 and has become our resident Supreme Court 'expert' with her annual October SCOTUS update. This week she met with long time ICL member Don Gallagher for an interview.

**Don:** So Joan you have been involved in ICL in several different roles but this is your first experience on the Board of Directors. Of course we are grateful that you are willing to step in, but tell me how did it all happen?

Joan: Well first of all the nominating committee asked

me whether I was interested in filling the position. Since I have personally enjoyed ICL and appreciate the volunteer effort by others I felt that I should take the offer seriously. I felt ICL deserved a thoughtful response and after some analysis concluded that I had something to offer.

Don: What is the first thing you are going to do as chair?

Joan: I plan to listen a lot!

Don: Where were you born and raised?

**Joan:** I was born in Washington DC, on August 8, 1945, between the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. My twin sister Nancy and I were taken home from the hospital a week later amid cheering and jubilation in the streets. After the war my parents moved to Boulder, Colorado, then to Philadelphia and, the summer I turned 8, to Portland, Oregon.

Don: Tell us about your parents?

**Joan:** My parents met when both were code breakers in Washington DC during the Second World War. My father was in the army; my mother was a civilian. Eventually both became math teachers in Portland - my father at Reed College, my mother at the Catlin Gabel School.

Don: Did you have siblings?

**Joan:** Three sisters, one was my twin. Unfortunately they are gone but they have left me a blessing and big responsibility as a stand-in grandmother. (None of my sisters lived long enough to see her grandchildren.) The grandchildren are currently 3, 6,6, 8 and 9. The 9 year-old is the only one in Oregon but when there is no pandemic, I see all of them fairly regularly.

Don: Tell me about your education.

**Joan:** After graduating from Cleveland High School, I attended Wellesley where I received my BA in Philosophy. While at Wellesley I developed a serious interest in philosophy. I was accepted as a PhD candidate in the philosophy department at Columbia University. After 4 years I changed my goals and applied to Rutgers Law School where I received my JD in 1976.

**Don:** So tell me your job search after graduating from law school in the mid-seventies and searching for a job. Had women been accepted in the law profession yet?

**Joan:** Not widely, at least in Oregon. I returned to Portland immediately after graduating from law school and began interviewing with large and midsize firms. The managing partner of one midsize firm had been away when I first interviewed at that firm, so I came back to meet with him. The

first thing he said to me was "my reaction to the idea of a woman lawyer is hell no." Others did not say it out loud but in fact there were few women practicing in large firms at that time.

**Don:** Then I understand that you interviewed for a position in the Oregon Legislature?

**Joan:** Yes. A friend showed my resume around and I was offered a job for the session beginning in January 1977. I accepted that position and as it turns out spent 30+ years working for the Legislature. I worked mostly in the Office of Legislative Counsel, drafting bills and giving legal advice to legislators.

Don: Tell me about any passions in retirement?

**Joan:** Travel, family, and time at the beach. I have taken several trips abroad, by myself, with friends and with an outfit called "Wilderness Travel." I have taken three trips to India with Wilderness Travel, one of which also included Bhutan and Nepal. I have also been to England, Central Asia, Fiji, Corfu, Morocco, Italy and Hawaii. I travel to see family when I can - currently Atlanta, Tumwater, Washington and Cloverdale, Oregon. And I travel (though not far) to my house on Cascade Head overlooking the mouth of the Salmon River and the beautiful Pacific Ocean.

**Don:** I have some serious questions about the alarming direction the SCOTUS is making but guess that I need to wait until October to ask you. I am looking forward to your presentation. Thank you again Joan for your willingness to assist ICL at this important time.

there was the classic vellow smiley face. Though copyright claims have been mixed throughout the years, the design is generally attributed to graphic artist Harvey Ross Ball, who created it in 1963 for a morale-building campaign at an insurance company. He was paid only \$45 and never copyrighted the design, which went on to become an enduring cultural phenomenon.
