Free at-home COVID-19 tests

Every home in the U.S. can NOW order 4 free at-home COVID-19 tests. The tests will be completely free—there are no shipping costs and you don't need to enter a credit card number.

This website is provided by the Time and Frequency Division of the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST). The reference for the time shown is UTC(NIST), which is the coordinated universal time scale maintained at NIST. UTC(NIST) serves as a national standard for frequency, time interval and time-of-day for the United States.

<u>Caroline Shaw</u> is a New York-based musician—vocalist, violinist, composer, and producer—who performs in solo and collaborative projects. She was the youngest recipient of the Pulitzer Prize for Music in 2013 for Partita for 8 Voices, written for the Grammy-winning Roomful of Teeth, of which she is a member. Most recently Caroline has been nominated for a Grammy award – a composer's award – for Best Contemporary Classical Composition, Narrow Sea (Dawn Upshaw, Gilbert Kalish & Sō Percussion) which will be announced at the 2022 Grammy Awards show on January 31st.

General admission tickets are \$25; Seniors and ICL members, \$5; Willamette University faculty and staff, \$10. Students are admitted free.



SDO | Solar Dynamics Observatory

SDO: The Solar Dynamics Observatory is the first mission to be launched for NASA's Living With a Star (LWS) Program, a program designed to understand the causes of solar variability and its impacts on Earth. SDO is designed to help us understand the Sun's influence on Earth and Near-Earth space by studying the solar atmosphere on small scales of space and time and in many wavelengths simultaneously.



SDO's goal is to understand, driving towards a predictive capability, the solar variations that influence life on Earth and humanity's technological systems by determining how the Sun's magnetic field is generated and structured

how this stored magnetic energy is converted and released into the heliosphere and geospace in the form of solar wind, energetic particles, and variations in the solar irradiance.

Measurements of the interior of the Sun, the Sun's magnetic field, the hot plasma of the solar corona, and the irradiance that creates the ionospheres of the planets are our primary data products.
