ICL Update:

 MEMBERSHIP SURVEY 2022 Results: Please note that the purpose of the survey was to inform the board when making schedule decisions for meeting again in person in the fall. The survey results were not the only consideration. (see below)

Total: Σ=212	POLL QUESTIONS - Total Responses = 122
31	4 hours a day, 2 days a week (as we did pre-pandemic)
25	3 hours a day, 2 times a week
50	3 hours a day, once a week
31	2 hours a day, 2 times a week
75	Once a week (2 or 3 hours) plus a second day occasionally (field trips, social events, topical presentations, etc)

• ICL Board Meeting (February 17th):

- The board voted to meet 2 hours a day twice a week in the Fall-same as the current schedule except we expect to be meeting in person. This decision is intended to transition back to in-person classes without the addition of a major schedule change, introduce new members to a more traditional ICL environment, and give the Curriculum Committee a clear plan to begin scheduling for the Fall semester.
- Dues will be charged for next year: \$165 per member regardless of if in person or on Zoom. Stay tuned for more information on payment.
- The March board meeting was moved from March 17th to Tuesday, March 15th to make the decision of whether or not to meet in person or continue via Zoom and give presenters and members a little more time to make adjustments.

Salem City Club presents: Oregon's Broken Primary System with Phil Keisling


Well-known political analyst and former Oregon Secretary of State Phil Keisling thinks Oregon has built an enviable reputation for its leadership in enacting some of America's most "pro-voter" policies.

In 2000, we were the first state to automatically mail

ballots to all active registered voters; this "Vote at Home" approach will be used in 8 other states in 2022. In 2015, Oregon was the nation's first state to adopt Automatic Voter Registration, by which eligible citizens can be registered as new voters or can have their existing records updated. This approach is now used in more than 20 states.

But in one area, Keisling thinks Oregon continues to be a "national laggard." Oregon still runs so-called "closed" primary elections, by which voters are required to be a member of a major political party to participate in choosing nominees for key offices, including US Senator, Congress, Governor, and state legislature. Oregon's Non Affiliated Voters (NAVs) now number more than 1 million -- more than either the Democratic or Republican parties can claim as members - and more than half of all 18-34 year old voters fall in this category. But as explained by Keisling, "These voters are now typically shut out of these taxpayer-funded primary elections -- which more often than not effectively decide who'll prevail in the general elections."
