Member Spotlight: The Saga and Life of B - Lee Coyne - By Marje S Wallace

We have all met B-Lee Coyne at our ICL meetings. But do we really know him?

Lee became a member of ICL in September 2013. He was brought into the group by his now deceased spouse, Carmela Coyne. She was a Math professor from Manila, in the Philippines. She and Lee were married for 30 years.

Lee was born November 1941, just before Pearl Harbor was attacked by Japan and World War II began.

Lee's father, Al Coyne, was the first man drafted from Brooklyn. He appealed it...and lost, leaving Lee without a father figure in his earliest years of development. After Dad shipped out, Lee and his mother, Ida Coyne, went to live with his grandparents, a single aunt, and an uncle; five adults who surrounded, supported, and protected him. Lee was essentially treated as a diminutive adult.

Lee's home life was news and war broadcasts on the radio, Big Band music and radio stories of the period: The Shadow, Laurel and Hardy, Amos and Andy, Charlie Chaplin, Buster Keaton and many more.

He remembers doing jigsaw puzzles, playing with the typewriter, learning geography and letters while he drank his milk. He gave me an example of his memory of this moment in time. His mom would give him a glass of milk and have him pretend to be a train engineer and each sip of milk would be a whistle stop on the rail line. That was how he learned his letters, reading and names of the east coast states and their capitals. Last stop Key West, Florida!

Another method of teaching his mother used, was providing many fun opportunities to expose a very young Lee to the world of words. He also had the Webster Dictionary at age 5, and it left an imprint on a budding writer.

Following the end of World War II, Lee's father made it home to Brooklyn, to his grandparents house. Like many soldiers returning from war, he carried home a case of PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder/ Shell Shock). Bouts of anger were not unusual, and a young Lee was the target during some of these outbursts. The emotional abuse dealt out during these encounters, was a likely impetus for becoming the Lee I am interviewing today.

Lee's quiet home was no more...despite this, Lee grew and developed his love for the written word. By the 3rd grade, Lee was selling his love poems to his peers for 1 penny each. Good money for the period! A less poetry gifted peer hired Lee to write love poems for a young girl he was trying to impress. This was the launch pad for Lee's future writing career.

Jumping forward, Lee is now a young adult of 22, he is now attending Fairleigh Dickinson University in New Jersey. While there, he ran for office on the student board and became the school Treasurer.

During all this growth, a young activist was emerging...

Lee's Causes and accomplishments were:

Principal Letter 1956: Lee wrote a proposal letter on needed lighting improvements for study hall area at school and getting the library open for students on Sunday. The proposal was accepted, and the principal led the fund-raising campaign to pay for the needed changes. This was quite a feather in Lee's Press Reporter hat of the future and wet his appetite for even more.

English Essay Contest 1959: A Daily News writing contest and Lee wrote a paper and his piece wins!!

Ask Me? Presentation 1962: Lee's subject this time was "Weather Satellites". These early ventures into public speaking and answering questions concisely and with researched, up to date information, further prepared young Lee to become the B- Lee Coyne of the future.


Launched first use of shut-in teleconferences in the USA, called the Sunshine Line. NY City


