### Salem Public Library hours, services expanded:

Salem Public Library offers new hours and more services beginning Tuesday, April 5. In addition to an earlier opening time and Sunday hours, we will *reopen the West Salem Branch*, and open the Teen Scene and study rooms at the Main Library.

**Study Rooms Open**: <u>Library study rooms</u> are free and are available to reserve for up to two hours per day per user.

The West Salem book drop will remain closed at all times. Books can be returned inside the library during open hours. Other services available during open hours at the West Salem Branch will include browsing, checkout, holds pickup, library cards, <u>wifi and public computers</u>, and use of the West Salem Branch <u>study and meeting rooms</u>.

### Excavation Set to Start in April on Mission Indian School Sites

Excavation is set to begin in April on two Salem sites of historical interest, as part of a public archaeology project led by the City of Salem. The project focuses on the sites of the former **Oregon Indian Mission Manual Labor School** and the school's administration building (which later became known as the parsonage). A Preserving Oregon grant awarded to Willamette U. from <u>Oregon Heritage</u> is partially funding this project.

The boarding school and administration building were built southeast of the <u>1841 Methodist Mission House built by Jason Lee</u>. Between 1841 and 1842. Native American children from across the Pacific Northwest

## Wearing a hearing aid may lower the risk of dementia

Researchers from the universities of Oxford and Ulster reviewed the data of more than 4300 American adults (average aged 68) and found that untreated hearing loss was twice as likely to produce mild cognitive impairment (MCI) which is a precursor to dementia. There was no significant difference in risk between those with normal hearing and those who used a hearing aid. (ALZ Journal, 2.14.22) Previous studies have shown a link between hearing loss and the onset of dementia. It is hypothesized that this link is because hearing loss increases social isolation. Nearly 50% of Americans ages 75 and old have disabling hearing loss.

It was disbanded when the mission closed in 1844. The school building served as the first campus for Willamette University between 1853 and 1864.

The research goals of the project are to better understand the locations of the two buildings and provide greater context to their original stories.

Excavation work will be supervised by Archaeologist Ross Smith, with field work support provided by volunteers with the Oregon Archaeological Society and students at <u>Willamette University</u>. Greek students visiting Willamette University will complete photogrammetry, which involves converting photographs into digital models.

Artifacts uncovered during the dig will be recorded and processed by **Oregon Archaeological Society** volunteers in archival-quality materials for storage and access as part of the **Willamette Heritage Center's** collections.


## National Parks requiring early reservations for peak season
