The Brain, Nostalgia and Pain

Nostalgia – generally defined as that wistful and sentimental longing for some positive past experience – turns out to be helpful in reducing physical pain. A current fMRI study shared in The Journal of Neuroscience (JNeurosci, March 2022) showed that both male and female participants had decreased brain activity in pain-related regions when looking at nostalgic photos of things like old cartoons, childhood toys and candy – compared to more modern images of these same items.

Although the reason for how nostalgia reduces the perception of physical pain is not yet clear, the study found that the thalamus plays a key role suggesting that there is some modulatory mechanism connected to creating nostalgia and reducing pain. The thalamus (Greek for inner chamber) transmits 98% of our sensory information (vision, taste, touch and balance) to the cerebral cortex. (Smell does not travel this route.) The thalamus also regulates consciousness, sleep, alertness and wakefulness.

Because nostalgia includes a feeling of connectedness, the greater the nostalgic feeling experienced by the participants, the greater reduction in their perception of pain. The researchers plan to use different age groups in future research and to look into the impact of more personal nostalgic cues rather than generic nostalgia. While not expected to be a blanket solution to pain, they do expect a much stronger pain-relieving effect if participants observe personal scenarios, according to one of the researchers. So, the next time you feel achiness and soreness in those joints, you might try skipping the pain reliever and looking at those old photos, movies, childhood toys and music posters.

Whole Foods Gets an Amazon Makeover

When Amazon bought Whole Foods in 2017, they made very few changes, but they have recently changed that policy and gone high tech at a test-store in Washington, D.C. The "Amazonification" of Whole Foods includes an option to shop by "scanning the QR code in your Amazon app" or scanning your hand at a kiosk that links your palm to your Amazon account. To pay, you scan your hand at the check out. Your receipt shows up in an email later. Considered a bit "Orwellian" by some, it is anticipated that this is the future of shopping.
