# **Council Considers Improvement Bond May 16**

Salem City Council will consider a proposal from the Infrastructure Bond Engagement Steering Committee for a \$300 million Community Improvement Bond package at a work session May 16. Depending on the outcome, a bond proposal could be ready for City Council to consider at their regular May 23 meeting.

The bond would allow the community to invest in critical projects to improve streets, sidewalks, parks and public safety without increasing the City's property tax rate. The proposal was the result of previously identified needs and project ideas from:

- neighborhood associations
- advisory boards and commissions
- public testimony at steering committee meetings

# 2022 Reynolds Symposium: Aalto: Light at Mount Angel Abbey

The year 2020 marked the 50th anniversary of the completion of Alvar Aalto's Library at Mount Angel Abbey. After a pandemic delay, we will be celebrating this milestone and honoring the beautiful and impactful ways that Aalto made daylighting an integral part of his designs.

The Finnish architect, Alvar Aalto, has been named "a master of light." His architecture is among the most well-regarded of the mid-twentieth century for his innovative use of daylight, which was an integral part of his architectural language. While the majority of his built work is in Finland and northern Europe, two of his buildings are located in the United States; in Cambridge, Massachusetts, at MIT and in Oregon, at Mount Angel Abbey. During his career, Aalto designed 10 libraries, and a number of reading spaces within other buildings, spanning from Viipuri Library, in Vyborg Russia in 1935 to Mount Angel Library in 1970. Arguably the Mount Angel Library is his best, and it is certainly most sophisticated in terms of its luminous design.

The Mount Angel Library has recently undergone repairs of its skylight and is once again in pristine condition. In celebration of this anniversary and to celebrate the role that this magnificently daylighted building has played in the lives of architecture students and faculty at the University of Oregon, and beyond, the 4th John Reynolds Symposium will focus on Aalto and light in architecture.

The Symposium will launch on Friday with an evening keynote and reception in southwest Portland at the headquarters of Nordic Northwest, and run the full day on Saturday at the Mount Angel Abbey Library, Mount Angel, Oregon.

It will feature some of the Pacific Northwest's leading educators and architects on the topic of daylighting, speakers from Finland (Alvar Aalto's homeland) and those with insights into Aalto's work.

Early bird registration is \$30 for Friday and \$125 for Saturday, After April 30, full registration is \$40 for Friday and \$150 for Saturday. A limited number of complimentary seats are available for students. Please note that the capacity is limited. Registration
