### **ICL Update:**

- Board Meeting: Thursday, September 15, 2022 from 1:30 pm to 3:30 pm. On Zoom. All members are welcome.
- Be sure to keep checking the <u>Class Schedules</u> online as things are still being added. The Google Calendar on that page has been updated.
- The online Membership Directory has been updated in several places. Nothing majorly significant, but if you downloaded the PDF to any of your devices, you might want to download it again with the corrected version. - Note that Compass Cash is going to go away. Balances on cards right now
  will be transferred to our new cards (expected tomorrow). However, you will
  not be able to add more cash to the cards. People can also request refunds
  of any remaining balance they have.
- If you get locked out of Kaneko for whatever reason, there's a few things you can do: 1.) Call Dave MacMillan using the number in the membership directory. Tip: add name and number to your Contacts on your phone.
   2.) Try to follow someone in the doors in the middle of the building; go through another set of doors into the courtyard and take the walkway to the left; then bang on the windows.
   3.) Call Campus Safety (503-370-6911); they'll drive one of those carts over and let you in; Tip: add name and number to the Contacts on your phone.
- In case of an emergency or someone needing medical attention: If serious, call 911. If it does not appear to be an emergency but further evaluation seems prudent, call Campus Safety (503-370-6911). ## Willamette Update: U.S. News and World Report names WU on 'best college' list

Willamette University is among the best arts and science institutions in the nation for 2022-23, according to <u>U.S. News and World Report's annual rankings</u>.

For the fourth consecutive year, the university is one of the top three liberal arts colleges in the Pacific Northwest — and the first or second-highest rated institution in Oregon — on the "Best Colleges" list. The university received an overall national ranking of 76.

This is also true for random "warnings" on your computer telling you to call Microsoft, Apple, or any other major company for "remote support" of your "infected" computer. These are extortion scams and not only can you lose everything on your computer in seconds, these scammers can also access any website for which you have saved passwords including your bank and credit card sites.

### Bottom line: THINK and QUESTION any email that tries to lure you into what could possibly be a trap.

And yes, this is another reason we're implementing Google 2-Step Verification...if someone tricks you into giving away your email address and password, they won't be able to use it.

So please set up 2-Step Verification ASAP if you haven't already done so! (See email with more information about the 2-Step Verification including the instructions.) This only applies to those with Willamette U accounts. New ICL members without Compass Cards (WU Student ID cards) do not have accounts setup yet, so don't need to do anything. But stay tuned!

Oregon has a long history of environmental planning. In 1899, the Oregon legislature declared 30 miles of Oregon beach as a public highway from the Columbia River to the south line of Clatsop County. Throughout the 20th century, the Oregon legislature and communities throughout Oregon have placed an emphasis on land use from the role of the timber, fishing and mining industries to the planning necessary for cities and towns.

### The Brain and Déjà Vu?

The term "déjà vu" is French, and the literal translation means "already seen." But in everyday life, déjà vu refers to the weird feeling you get when you're in a situation that feels like you've already lived it and are somehow living it again.

Although directly related to seizures, plenty of people who don't have seizures experience déjà vu. Research suggests that it is caused by a memory mismatch – a new experience is stored in long-term memory and completely bypasses the short-term memory – so that you have the weird sensation that you've had the experience before. In reality, it's just your brain's memory system taking a bounce.

Another reason offered is that déjà vu occurs more commonly when you are overly distracted. Sleep deprivation can add to this. The theory is that you feel like you are reliving an experience when you are really just too tired to distinguish reality from dreams.

Whatever the reason, just enjoy the fun experience of déjà-vu.
