# The ICL Spring Book Read: "All That She Carried: The Journey of Ashley's Sack" is written by renowned Harvard History Professor Tiya Miles - Non-fiction

A humble cloth sack was given by Rose, an enslaved woman in 1850's South Carolina, to her nine year old daughter, Ashley, before the child was sold. This single beloved item, passed down and almost lost, becomes the centerpiece of a deeply evocative story about survival and love.

The author's work to uncover the story from a faint historical record becomes part of the story itself. Bank's work illustrates the importance of alternative archival materials to document the history of those whose experience may be lost or under-represented due to the absence of a traditional paper record.

The works of **rubén garcía marrufo** are an audiovisual fabulation of the awe-inducing instant, gathering phantasmagorical narratives, silences, and rituals which expand the ways we embrace the concept of border, going beyond its social, historical and political meaning, to manifest border as the site for a vital existence. With video, film, and sound experimentation as their principal medium, they project their pieces onto public spaces or edit them into fragmented montages that alter our perception of the moving image, in an exercise that fuses



### Biology professor Christopher Smith to give public lecture November 7, 2022 : 7:00 PM | Willamette U. | Paulus Lecture Hall

Professor of Biology Christopher Smith is giving a public lecture, "Climate Change, Renewable Energy, and Endangered Species in Western U.S.: A Catch-22?".

Smith is sharing his scholarship as winner of the 2021 Lynwood W. Swanson Scientific Research Award, an honor from the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust. He is the first Willamette faculty member to receive the award.

The unfolding climate catastrophe is causing the extinction of thousands of species worldwide. Managing this ecological crisis requires a rapid shift to renewable energy. However, renewable energy development itself

has dramatic impacts on the environment through habitat loss and the disruption of natural ecosystems. Shifting to a carbon-free energy economy while reducing the environmental impacts of renewable energy development will require difficult choices about what we can still save. A team of scientists from across the U.S. – led by Willamette University faculty – are working together to tackle this challenge. ...continue reading...

Please don't rake or blow your leaves into the street. It's prohibited and can cause serious issues during heavy rain. <u>Salem Revised Code</u> requires that all residents remove leaves that fall naturally on their property and within the right-of-way behind the curb. The City of Salem is responsible for leaves that fall in the street.

So what should you do with the leaves? You can put them in your yard debris bin, compost them at home, or take them to the annual Fall Leaf Haul! You can drop off your leaves, grass clippings, and tree limbs at our drop off location on the designated days. Because this event is for residents only, we can't accept leaves, grass clippings, or tree limbs from commercial landscapers.

Bagging leaves is not required. If you bag your leaves, please consider using paper leaf bags.

### United Nations COP27: For a livable planet

The **27th Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change**, to be held in Egypt from November 6 to 18, 2022, seeks renewed solidarity between countries to deliver on the landmark Paris Agreement, for people and the planet.

The word 'parties' refers to the countries that attend, which are those that signed up to the original UN climate agreement in 1992. The first COP meeting was held in Berlin, Germany, in March 1995.

The COPs are the biggest and most important annual climate-related conferences on the planet.

#### Word to Know: obnubilate

(ob·nu·bi·late) transitive verb

1. Becloud, obscure "I was obnubilated by his grandiose and lavish displays of wealth."

### The Political History of Obnubilate

The meaning of obnubilate becomes clearer when you know that its ancestors are the Latin terms ob- (meaning "in the way") and nubes ("cloud"). It's a high-flown sounding word, which may be why it often turns up in texts by and about politicians. This has been true for a long time. In fact, when the U.S. Constitution was up for ratification, 18th-century Pennsylvania statesman James Wilson used obnubilate to calm fears that the president would have too much power: "Our first executive magistrate is not obnubilated behind the mysterious obscurity of counselors.... He is the dignified, but accountable magistrate of a free and great people."
