A Bobbie Dolp Lecture Series Presentation: Preservation Horticulture and the National Parks with Susan Dolan, National Parks Service

The conservation mission of the National Park Service includes the preservation of cultural landscapes. These historically significant places are often composed of character-defining vegetation that requires care with Preservation Horticulture. In this talk, Susan will examine the work of Preservation Horticulture in a variety of cultural landscapes within the national parks.

Susan Dolan is the National Park Service Bureau Historical Landscape Architect and Manager of the NPS Park Cultural Landscapes Program. Her responsibilities include developing, implementing and overseeing a service-wide landscape preservation program that includes research, planning, stewardship, education and technology development.

Zooming Back to History - A Deadly Wind: The 1962 Columbus Day Storm

The Columbus Day Storm of 1962 was a freak of nature, a weather outlier with deadly winds topping one hundred miles per hour. The storm killed dozens, injured hundreds, damaged more than fifty thousand homes, and leveled enough timber to build one million homes. To find an equally ferocious storm of its kind, fast-forward fifty years and cross the continent to Superstorm Sandy's 2012 attack on the East Coast.

History as to Why We Vote on the Second Tuesday of November

As implied by its name, Election Day is, well, a single day. That wasn't always the case, however: States used to hold elections whenever they wanted within a 34-day period leading up to the first Wednesday in December. This ultimately created some issues, as you might imagine — early voting results ended up holding too much sway over late-deciding voters, for one thing. The current date was implemented by the Presidential Election Day Act of 1845, and federal elections now occur every two years on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

That may sound arbitrary at first, but the date was chosen quite deliberately. American society was much more agrarian in the mid-19th century than it is today, and it took a full day of traveling for many to reach their polling place. Church made weekends impractical, and Wednesday was market day for farmers, so Tuesday proved ideal. November, meanwhile, worked because weather was still fairly mild, and the harvest was complete by then.
