Brain Tip: Reading Helps Memory

Reading continues to be a popular hobby and it's understandable – it is both engaging and relaxing; it can be done alone or with friends, as in book clubs. A team of researchers at the Beckman Institute for Advanced Science and Technology has uncovered yet another reason to love reading: it may help preserve memory skills as people—and their brains—grow older. (Frontiers in Psychology, 2021)

Leisure reading helps build mental abilities like episodic memory (memory of events) and working memory (the capacity to hold things in our minds while we engage in other mental processes.) While reading, episodic memory allows us to remember what happened in previous chapters and working memory helps us keep track of things that happened in recent paragraphs. While these two types of memory tend to decline as we age, habitual readers routinely practice these skills and keep that ability in better condition.

It isn't clear if reading helps improve memory or if strong working memory maintains reading comprehension skills. More research is being done. For now, however, the message is clear: to stay mentally sharp as we age - read a book.
