The 8 Best Cities for Music Lovers

A reminder that one box, one soup cup, and one drink cup per meal swipe are available upon request from the cashier at the time of entry. This option is for a meal to be taken to-go, not as an additional meal after eating in Goudy or for leftover food.

At the start of the school year, Goudy purchased over 300 spoons for service which has now been reduced to 20. This is not enough to supply for everyone at meal services. We ask that anyone who has Goudy dishware and utensils to return it to help avoid the cost of purchasing more.

For diners seeking a smaller, quieter place to eat away from the bustle of the dining room, two rooms divided by a partition, the Chloe Clarke Willson Room and the Gustavus Hines Room (referred to as the Willson-Hines Room) are available when the rooms have not been reserved for events. When exiting the servery and before entering the dining room, turn to the left and head down the corridor and to the right are the two available rooms.
