City: Image, Imagination, Performance

You take delight not in a city's seven or seventy wonders, but in the answer it gives to a question of yours.

—Italo Calvino. *Invisible Cities*

What questions can we ask of cities, about their spaces, histories, the images that they leave in our minds? Cities have long figured in the human imagination, and have long been understood as hotbeds of creativity; but what constitutes a city's presence, its identity? Is its image based on experience, on memory, on myth? Our research community will pose a series of questions to several cities—St. Petersburg and Rome, New York and Portland—examining each through the works of poets, mapmakers, and filmmakers. We will ask questions about the relationships between a city and its residents, and the connections between urban spaces and the spaces of creativity and performance. In doing so, we hope to better understand the ways in which cities are rendered visible, legible, poetic.

Our research community—made up of two faculty members and two students—will draw upon materials and methodologies from a variety of disciplines: Russian literature, urban studies, art history, film making, American history, poetry, cartography, and performance studies. Together we will read, view and discuss a core group of texts and films, through which we will approach our individual projects. Sarah Clovis Bishop will respond to a body of work by Russian poet Elena Shvarts that moves between Rome and St Petersburg; at the same time she will consider poems that have been translated from the page to the stage. Alba Newmann Holmes will complete a book chapter on Langston Hughes' documentation and invention of Harlem, proposing an analogy between his poems and the collaged maps of the Situationists. Brynn Raymond will investigate the material conditions in Harlem during Hughes' lifetime and the effects of these on creative productivity, drafting a research paper by summer's end. And Grace Cohen will put theory into practice, creating her own experiential, filmic map of Portland that draws upon the work of the Situationists, while also exploring questions of translation across genres: from paper map to a cinematic one.

While the city is a central trope for each of these endeavors, movement across media and genres is also very important (poem to play, poem to map, map to film), as is the concept of performance. Our collaborative research plan allows each of us to come into contact with and experiment with new materials, new genres. In addition to responding to one another's writing, we aim to join in the experiential aspects of Grace's project, traveling together to Portland to participate in the mapping process. Michel de Certeau suggests that when we move through a city, mapping it with our bodies, we create the text that is the city itself—in doing so this summer, we will become authors as well as students of the city.

We are requesting a small budget for this exploratory work in Portland and for shared texts, please see attached. We have also included a proposed list of readings.
