The Salem Public Library Foundation is recognized for the consistent support of the library's programs, services, staff, and its particularly exceptional work in 2021-2022 to provide support for the library's renovation project. The 50-year-old building was repaired and reimagined beyond the scope of the public Seismic and Safety Bond that provided the base funding.

The Foundation worked tirelessly to support the initial effort to pass a \$18.6 million General Obligation Bond Measure in 2017 to address the building's seismic, safety, and accessibility issues. The Foundation then stepped in to raise money for additional design and construction on the building that went beyond those elemental features, including replacing concrete blocks with windows on the west side of the building, replacing a staircase, expanding the Teen Scene, an enlarged Discovery Room in the Children's Library, and vast improvements to the Library entrance. 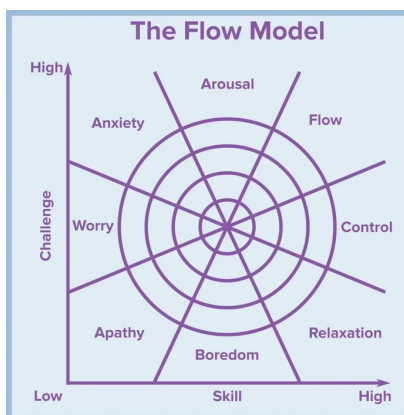

New years often come with new resolutions. Get back in shape. Read more. Make more time for friends and family.

My list of resolutions might not look quite the same as yours, but each of our resolutions represents a plan for something new, or at least a little bit different. As you craft your 2022 resolutions, I hope that you will add one that is also on my list: feel more flow.

Psychologist Mihály Csíkszentmihályi's research on flow started in the 1970s. He has called it the "secret to happiness." Flow is a state of "optimal experience" that each of us can

## Spring Fever and the Brain 🌸 🌻 ☀️

More daylight can help the biological clock ticking in your brain make you more alert during the day and help you sleep better at night. Called ‘spring fever’, we think of it as giving us renewed energy and, indeed it does. When the sun is out and the air is warmer, we want to be outside enjoying it. We are more likely to run into others doing the same thing and we benefit from this casual socialization. Some get busy with gardening, also known to boost mental and physical health (so long as we don’t overdo it).

While spring fever is not a medical diagnosis, the effects of sunlight and warm weather are clear. As Dr. Norman Rosenthal, Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at Georgetown University School of Medicine and renowned seasonal affective disorder expert, “It manifests in different ways. Sometimes it’s a sheer exuberance. People are smiling, laughing and celebrating...it’s a fever in the best sense of the word.”

More light has two basic effects: First, it tells our circadian clock when dawn occurs. Every cell in our body has a clock. This keeps our bodies synched to the earth; Second, it creates an alertness making us better able to process tasks, feel less depressed and to generally have more energy.

More daylight can also boost your mood because the neurons, lacking serotonin in the winter months, now get flooded with this neurotransmitter – known as a key factor in mood regulation. One study published by Innovations in Neuroscience (2013) suggests that serotonin gets stimulated through your skin – another reason why we have an urge to be outside in the nicer weather.

### Tech Tip: Don’t share TMI (Too Much Information) on social media

Even if you use privacy settings for your accounts, it is still a good idea to avoid sharing too much personal information on social media. This is especially true if you plan to travel. Save your plans for leaving and share your photos only after you return home. Burglars use social media to know when people are out of town and away from their homes to choose their next victims.
